CALIFORNIA WINTER PEARS ARE LIMITED

The California Fruit Distributors have issued the following statement under date of August 31 regarding fruit in California:

The following gives number of cars of deciduous fruit shipped to all points by all members of this company for the week ending Monday night, August 30:

Plums and prunes—43 cars. But few cars of this variety are going forward and shipments will soon altogether cease.

Peaches—155 cars. Shipment of Salways is increasing, but rather slowly, as the crop is not ripening as fast as had been expected.

Pears—113 cars. The amount of winter pears available is very limited and the few that we have to offer are being taken by the trade as fast as we can secure them.

Grapes—374 cars. The grape movement is now in full swing. Tokays are going forward from the principal table grape sections and shipments will continue in large volume until the close of the season.
