

### CITY COUNCIL DOES MUCH BUSINESS

Steps Taken by City Council Tending Towards Betterment of City Conditions.

Routine business occupied the attention of the city council at its session on Tuesday evening. Many matters tending toward civic improvement were considered. Sidewalks were ordered in, water mains were considered, paving of streets talked of—in short, the meeting signified another step toward making Medford a better town in which to live.

All the bills for the past month were read and ordered paid and reports of the various city officials received.

The liquor license of Adams Bros. on the West Side was transferred to W. F. Rau of the Moore hotel, and a petition for a license from George Midles was read and license granted.

Bids were received for the building of cement sidewalks for the city were rejected, as they were not accompanied with checks.

Mrs. L. G. Gardner put in a claim for \$75 due for treatment given at her hospital for a stranger, who was injured recently by the Shasta Limited. The claim was referred to the city attorney.

The city attorney was ordered to put into resolution form the matter of paving North Orange street.

Outhouses in the city for some time have been causing trouble, and the matter was discussed at some length. The matter was referred to the city health officer, who may order them all removed.

A cement sidewalk was ordered in on Ivy street between Main and Fourth streets. A petition for a walk on Tenth street was referred to a committee.

An ordinance requiring all residences to connect to sewers when their street was supplied with sewer main was passed and will be enforced.

Other minor business was transacted.

### BUILDING PERMITS FOR ONE MONTH IN EUGENE

EUGENE, Or., Sept. 8.—While August is always a dull building month in Eugene, the permits issued for the past month, according to the report of Building Inspector McFarland, just made public, totaled over \$59,000, which is an average for the summer months. Permits for 24 residences, two business blocks and the remodeling of many residences were issued during the month.

### MUCH ACTIVITY COPPER MINES

Copper Field on Rogue River Divide Being Exploited—Building Road to Mine.

Great activity is being manifested in the copper district on the Rogue River divide over from Trail. Different prospects are being opened up and a ledge 600 feet wide and several miles long, rich in copper and gold, is being uncovered.

The company in control of the Thomas property have had 15 men at work all summer. A wagon road eight miles long has been built from Bastow's up to the Rogue River divide and rails, boilers, cars and other machinery has been taken in.

There is considerable talk of eastern capitalists taking over the Big Raleigh property and building a railroad to connect with the Pacific & Eastern, a distance of about 15 miles.

The Bullion Hill property, owned by A. B. Saling and company, is also being opened up and is showing high values.

Many companies are in process of incorporation and considerable excitement is manifested. Medford has tributary to it huge properties rich in copper and gold, and with the construction of railroads this city will reap a rich harvest.

Steinhardt & Kelly purchased the entire Hood River apple crop last year. Mr. Steinhardt will hold a conference with the directors of the Applegrowers' union and it is said the firm will purchase the entire apple crop of the valley this season.
