

TEDDY WILL COME BACK AS A BUG

Humane Society Woman Asserts His Soul Will Revisit Earth In a Bug or Something

Chicago, Sept. 9.—"When Col. Roosevelt, now hunting big game in darkest Africa, departs this life he will return to earth again, his soul incased in the body of some small, inferior, jungle loving animal—or possibly an insect."

This statement is made by Mrs. William P. Black, who has attracted attention from time to time by her nursery of pets, which consists of eight dogs, nine cats and forty-eight pigeons—all of them according to their mistress, being possessed with souls of humans who have departed.

Mrs. Black is a member of the humane society and other organizations that protect animals.

"Col. Roosevelt's slaughter of those animals in Africa is pitiful," said Mrs. Black. "I am not a sentimentalist, but when a man does such things for the sake of the sport of it he is to be pitied."

"We read the other day that he killed an elephant. I am just as sure as I am sitting here that when he dies his soul will be sent back to earth again in the form of some small animal of even lower degree than those he has been killing, perhaps an insect."

"Roosevelt has only one chance to save his soul. If he repents his soul will be sent back to earth again in the body of a human. I believe that his present greatness as a public character has been due to a steady rise from one life to another as a human. He had a wonderful chance in the next life, which he has now ruined."

Mrs. Black does not believe in spiritualism, theosophy, vegetarianism or socialism. She holds the theory that there exists a purgatory on earth, and that this is carried out by the transmigration of human souls at the end of great physical existence to the body and lower types of life for sins committed.

DEEPEST HOLE EVER DRILLED IN WESTERN HEMISPHERE

NO CANADIAN DUTIES ON PULP

Will Try To Capture Paper Industry As Result of Payne Tariff Restrictions

MONTREAL, Sept. 9.—While there is resentment in this country over the new provisions of the Payne tariff in so far as they affect the pulp and paper industries, it is felt both at Ottawa and Quebec that nothing can be gained by the imposition of export duties. The federal government, it is officially announced, will not take any action of a retaliatory nature, and at any legislation it may enact will be directed rather to final settlement of the difficulties.

It can be authoritatively announced that the future action of the Quebec Provincial government will be in line with the policy most acceptable to the Dominion as a whole, rather than any calculated to meet only the immediate situation as it is found in the Province of Quebec.

The existing timber leases in that province owned by Americans, including more than 12,000 square miles, expired at the end of the current year. It is certain that the Provincial Government will elect to follow the example of Ontario and make it a condition of all new leases that there shall be absolutely no exportation of unmanufactured pulp wood to the United States in so far as the Crown lands are concerned which are owned by the provinces. It would require an act of the Dominion Government to prohibit any such exportations from other than Crown lands. Considerably more than 50 per cent of the unmanufactured pulp wood exported from Quebec Province to the United States is exported by farmers from their own lands.

LETTER ENCIRCLES THE GLOBE IN NINETY DAYS

MINNEAPOLIS, Sept. 9.—Mrs. Albert Bushnell has had returned to her a letter written by and addressed to herself ninety days ago that she sent on a journey around the globe, having first arranged for its forwarding.

This is believed to be a record for "around the world" manuscript, noted by their senders. It lost very little time and covered approximately 300 miles a day.

Mrs. Bushnell posted the letter in Minneapolis addressed to herself in Calcutta, India. At the same time she deposited two post cards, one to the postmaster at Calcutta directing him to forward the letter to Tokio, Japan; the other to the postmaster at Tokio, requesting the letter be sent to the return address in Minneapolis.

Just 90 days after the letter and cards were deposited in Minneapolis the original letter was received by Mrs. Bushnell. There are but three postmarks on the letter. The first shows that it arrived in Calcutta, was forwarded to Tokio, Japan, the same day, and on receipt there was read-dressed to Minneapolis.

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
