### **NEW TYPE CAR FOR** SHIPPING OF FRUIT

A German publication furnishes the following description of a new type of refrigerator car, which furnishes its own refrigerator;

The ear is covered with non-conductive material. At one end a small compartment is partitioned off, in connected with the nearest axle. Methylchloride is used for producing cold. This can be volatized at a low pressure, does not affect the copper pipes, and does not smell as bad as ammonia or sulphurous neid. While the car is in motion the compressor sucks the gas from the codensing coil, which is attached to the roof of the car, and presses it through a water tank into the condensor below the car which is supplied with a collector for the liquid methylchloride. From coils. Valves regulate the tempersture of the gas in entering and leaving the colling coil, and also make it possible that only dry, saturated gas s provided for the compressors. The arrangement for the collectors for the condensing and cooling coils renders the cooling of the car independent of the motion of the compressor, especially when the ear is not in motion.

A speed of 25 miles per hour and st 20 degrees temperature (Celsius) of the air, the interior of the car can be reduced to zero (Celsius) in forty er fifty minutes.

### STATUS OF THE CALIFORNIA CROP

The California Fruit Distributors issued the following letter regarding the status of the California fruit erop under date of September 7:

The following gives the number of ears of deciduous fruit shipped to all which a compressor is placed, which points by all members of this comis put in motion by belts connected pany for the week ending Monday night, September 6:

Plums and prunes-21 cars. The shipment of this variety has dwindled down to three or four cars per day and even this small shipment cannot continue much longer.

Peaches-115 cars. Shipment of Salways is now as heavy as it will be at any time during the season. As predicted, the crop is very light and previous estimates of 25 per cent of a full crop will have to be materially cut down, as a large percentage of there it is admitted into the cooling the fruit on the trees is not available for shipment owing to various deefets. Another week will practieally clean up this variety. A few cars of first class yellow Slings are still obtainable.

Pears-85 cars. As is the cast with the two preceding varieties, the pear shipments continue to decrease. There will be a comparatively small number of ears to be had for future shipment.

Grapes-406 cars. The shipment of grapes is now as heavy as it will be at any time during the season. The shipments of Black Prince are practically completed and the movement now consists almost entirely of Malagas and Tokays with the latter greatly in preponderance. Late reports from the Lodi district would indiente that previous predictions of an output not exceeding that of last year are likely to be borne out by the facts. Quality of the fruit is satisfactory; size of the berry is good and the color all that can be desired. The auction markets have been taking this variety so far at prices considerably in advance of those prevailing for the past two seasons. Should the supply be no larger than anticipated there seems to be no reason why the market should not be well maintained
