ENTIRE HOOD RIVER APPLE CROP SOLD

By the purchase of 7000 boxes of apples from the Hood River Applegrowers' union Saturday, Page & Son of Portland cleaned up the entire crop of apples that the Hood River Applegrowers' union handles. The purchase comprises 7000 boxes of apples that Steinhardt & Kelly failed to get and included what are known as the choice or second grade Spitzenbergs, Newtowns, Rome Beauties, Ganos, Oxbury Russetts, Ben Davis and Winesaps.

The price paid for these apples is said by Mr. Page and the officers of the union to be the highest ever paid for apples on the Pacific coast. Mr. Page, who is the pioneer fruit buyer of Portland and the first man to market Oregon fruit in the east, said today that if the Hood River Applegrowers' union had given his and other firms in Portland the opportunity that they did Steinhardt & Kelly that they would have paid just as high a price for the apples as did the eastern firm.

"I want to say," said Mr. Page, "that when the public becomes aware of the price that we paid for the apples that we have just purchased from the Hood River Applegrowers' union that they will be astonished. We feel, however, that we are justified in doing so on account of the oriental trade that we have secured. I expect in the near future that the trade across the Pacific will become as important as the trade to Europe. It is this fact that leads me to believe that the Oregon apple is destined to play a very important part in the apple trade of the world."

"Situated between the market in the orient and the markets of Europe, the unexcelled apples of Oregon are bound to command a price that will make them the most profitable crop that can be grown in the state."

RESOLUTION.

OVER 100 CARS OF BARTLETTS SHIPPED

Over 100 cars of Bartlett pears have been shipped from the Medford district this season. The last cars will go forth the coming week. Shipments of other varieties of pears are under way.

Good prices have been received for local fruit. It has topped the market wherever offered. In comparison with California, Washington and Colorado products, Rogue River pears have never failed to bring a high price.

The average price received is in the neighborhood of \$3 a box or \$2 net to the grower. Prices ranged from \$2.35 for fruit delayed in transmission and hence over-ripe to \$3.90.

VACANT LANDS ARE BEING RAPIDLY TAKEN

PORTLAND, Or., Sept. 14.—Vacant lands of the state are being settled in a way that has never been equaled. A private land company is opening up a huge tract around Lakeview, the purchasers of contracts now being on hand there in large numbers to take part in the drawing. On September 15 will start the fall colonist movement from the east, when thousands of new settlers will reach the state to make their permanent homes here.

Taking Wheat Lands.

The vacant wheat lands of central Oregon are being filled up at an unprecedented rate, the coming of railroads up the Deschutes being the cause of a big boom in wheat growing in that great undeveloped country. During the past week a record trip was made into the vacant lands about Bend by a party of settlers who went overland from Corvallis by auto. The trip was made from Corvallis to Bend, 150 miles, in one day, and the next morning members of the party filed on 320 acre homesteads near Bend and will engage in wheat growing. A tract of land of 250,000 acres in that district has just been included in the new 320-acre homestead law and is proving very attractive to settlers.

Hitchcock Coming.

Postmaster General Hitchcock will be in Portland September 22 and 23, these dates having been selected for the annual meeting of the Presidential Postmasters' association in this state. Mr. Hitchcock will attend the sessions and while here will be entertained at luncheon by the Portland Commercial club.
