

**NEWS FROM MINING DISTRICT OF JOSEPHINE**

(Grants Pass Outlook)

The Pickett Creek Copper company, which was recently incorporated and has taken over the rich discoveries made on the Pickett Creek, has organized and elected the following officers: J. M. Farmer, president; C. C. Overton, vice-president; W. T. Perry, Secretary; and G. L. Smith, treasurer. Extensive development work is planned which will open up the property for a distance of 6000 feet on the main ledge of copper ore, carrying high values in both copper and gold, and from all surface work so far accomplished, apparently is at least fifty feet in width. High grade shipping ore has been struck and shipping to the smelter will begin as soon as the road which is within a half a mile of the property is completed.

The copper standard is what is generally known as the Henry Booth property on Pickett Creek and is owned by a stock company of local people, Henry Booth being the principal owner. This property has been bonded to R. H. Bailey of Chicago, by A. H. Gunnell. Mr. Bailey has been making a study of the property for the past three weeks. Not only has he examined this particular property but he has traced the geological formation from the Bohemia district down to this property. He has studied the formation for several months and has followed it way into California. He thinks this is the best mineral belt in the United States and is very sanguine as to the property. He has now gone east to make arrangements to develop the same.

W. H. Ramsey of Wonder, the discoverer of the Buckeye group of copper claims and many other prospects has recently made a rich discovery, a mine containing platinum and also free gold. He was in town recently and showed us samples of rock from his new discovery which contains free gold and pans from 5 to 25 cents to a pan. The vein is four feet and of a greyish porphyry ore, and the claim is located about half a mile west of the Buckeye group. While in town Mr. Ramsey had some of the rock assayed by assayer Johnson and his return showed 8 ounces of platinum to the ton valued at \$166.60. Mr. Ramsey is having other assays made at Denver and other cities, so will soon know what the rock fully contains.

An order was made by the board of control at Salem, granting to O. G. Finkleburg the right to use the waters of the Powder river to reclaim a large portion of the Powder valley.
