## WHY FRUIT IS LOW IN GOTHAM MARKET

White & Co. Call Attention to Influx of New York Products—Errors of Brokers in Circulars Noted.

W. N. White & Co., fruit brokers, write the following on fruit conditions in the New York market to The Tribune:

In the papers arriving this week we notice our contemporaries' circulars and their talk about the high prices they were then getting and saying they were going to continue these high prices, in fact, going to exceed them.

This amused us very much. Last week we wrote you about people when they did not know or were afraid to back their opinion. They would say: "If it did not rain it would be fine weather," but here is a deliberate statement about prices increasing in value and would go even higher.

### Local Crops Ripen.

Had they studied the law of supply and demand they would have been careful in making those statements. Supposing they were out in California or Oregon, and knew that no other state could ship any goods; they would have a right to say the supply would fall off and the demand is good, and while that demand is good prices will keep on advancing, but to say what was going to happen in the future without considering the supply in the east shows that they were not keeping in touch with actualities. Anyone here working with New York state would know that the farmers of this state would be very eager to get their goods to market to participate in the prevailing high prices, and perhaps they would be very foolish if they did not do so. The consequence is there are plenty of plums on the New York market from nearby districts and instead of the Italian prunes, which started at \$1.70, going still higher, they have been sold on this market yesterday at 80c.

It is true some very fine ones made up to \$1.60, but we say that prunes will be sold cheap all this week and will continue to be sold cheap until the bulk of the New York state plums are off the market. Then, if we get fine weather, especially towards the end of the month, when we have the Hudson-Fulton celebration, with a large influx of people, estimated at an increase of over 2,000,000 for about 14 days, we believe then all kinds of fruit will sell at high prices.

### Pears Much Lower.

Pears also are much lower. In the first place the pears from Medford take too long to come forward and your growers should have got in sufficient help to have cleared their crop in 14 days. Had they done so, they would have been off the market before the New York state pears were ready, to which there are plenty of New York state pears selling in barrels of 160 pounds from \$5.50 to \$6.50 per barrel, according to sample. Hence Oregon pears are now lower in price.

We repeat that good red apples are sure to do well here the end of this month and the first week in October before red fruit in New York state is ready for the market. After that we shall have lower prices. Still, we do not say apples will be given away at any time this year, as crops in many states will be much shorter than parties expected some weeks ago.

## MEDFORD PEARS HEAD THE LIST

Hood River and Colorado Fruit Fair Below—What Fruit Growers Union Brought Growers.

A comparison of pear returns from the Mosier-Hood River district with those from Medford is shown by the sales made by Spobel & Day September 7. Bartlett pears from the East Hood River Fruit company and from Mosier growers—"fancy fruit in a fancy pack"—sold for \$1.65 to \$1.70 a box. Those from Medford for \$2.35 to \$3.05 a box. At the same time Flemish Beauty pears from Grand Junction sold for \$2.60 and Howald pears for \$2.20.

The returns from ears 3263 of Bartletts from Medford show that 96 boxes from Beckstoe and Bostwick realized \$3.05; 11 boxes, \$2.45; 10 boxes from A. C. Randall, \$2.75; 13 boxes from A. F. Meader, \$2.65; 86 boxes from D. W. Luke, \$2.75; 2 boxes, \$2.65; 4 boxes from D. McKillip, \$2.45; 9 boxes, \$2.75; 9 boxes from Forest Miller, \$2.45; 32 boxes from T. E. Merriek, \$2.45; 18 boxes from A. J. Dunlap, \$2.70; 17 boxes, \$2.80; 30 boxes, \$2.55; 3 boxes, \$2.40; 17 boxes from E. Walz, \$2.45; 4 from F. K.
