LONDON WANTS AMERICAN APPLES

In their opening circular letter for the season W. Dennis & Sons, London fruit brokers, say of the prospect for American apples and pears in their market:

"This year the home crop is rather below the average, and our own views are that the demand for American supplies will be better than last season. From the continent no definite statement upon which we can rely is obtainable. Germany, Belgium and France report prospects favorable, but we do not view their supplies, as far as this country is concerned, as of very great importance, at any rate as far as offering any serious competition with American or Canadian fruit.

"Trade is showing indications of improvement, and any real increase on this side would soon have a material effect both upon demand and prices.

"The one great factor which shippers always want to bear in mind is that early supplies are in full competition with every description of apple grown here. Falls and otherwise, and unless the imported article is something better, both in quality and color, it is likely to meet with a poor market. Later we look for a good, steady trade.

"Pears of all descriptions have for years been growing in favor with our buyers, and we have no hesitation in advising shippers to trust our markets with all the supplies they can. There is nothing on this side to compete with American imports, and the demand is gaining ground. The moment is near at hand when the bulk of the French crop will be exhausted, and we shall have to depend upon Bartlett's and Keiffers to take their place."

LAND DISTRIBUTION IN LAKE COUNTY GROWING

LAKEVIEW, Or., Sept. 15.—So great was the demand for Oregon lands last year that the Oregon Valley Land company, having sold the 11,992 original contracts for tracts out from the Oregon military road grant, found itself obliged to continue the sale until a total of 14,420 tracts had been sold. This made it necessary for the company to purchase nearly 100,000 acres in addition to the 300,000 acres originally bought from the Hunter Land company. This fact was brought out for the first time at the inception of the big land opening. A Seattle contract holder having figured out from the number of contracts listed that it would be impossible to cut the required number of tracts out of the original grant acreage in the sale, made objection and declared he was not getting a fair deal. The truth of the matter then came out, in a statement from President Martin, who explained why the company recently purchased the Hereford Cattle company's lands in the Goose Lake valley, and other lands to the extent of upwards of 100,000 acres in Lake county. Prominent attorneys here say they have looked into the legal phase of the distribution and can find no question as to the validity of the deal.
