## FIRST COMICE AVERAGE \$4.40

Sgobel & Day of New York, under date of September 11, say:

The situation as far as it concerns our friends in your section, with yesterday's prices, is as follows:

**Pears**—The only offering of Bartlett's from the northwest was one car from Medford, which sold from \$3.10 to \$2.60, with an average of \$2.92 per box, same to our care. This fruit was very handsome and taken lively. 16,000 boxes pears here this week, but about 5000 of them were not Bartlett's. The first Comice of the campaign sold, Anderson, San Jose, half boxes, average \$2.20. We have five carloads of them on the way from Block, Santa Clara, first of which sells next Tuesday. D'Anjou will do well here this season.

**Italians**—Three cars Thursday and seven cars Friday, which hurt the market. Averages are as follows: Blalock (Walla Walla), \$1.32 and \$1.11; Mosier (three cars), \$1.04 and 90c and 80c; Milton, \$1.08; The Dalles (4 cars), \$1.03, 97c, 97c, and 95c.

The Blalock and Milton cars were prime and sound, but the others, while the pears were fine, the condition was not always good and some leakers in a car hurts its sale, besides which it poured in torrents yesterday, and with seven cars offered down went the price as low as 85c. The offerings for early next week are to be small and we look for an advance believing that yesterday was the lowest market of the whole campaign, as the arrivals are certainly going to be small. Hungarians continue in good demand, \$1.75, to \$1.50 on all of good desirable size.

**Peaches**—First Colorado Elbertas sold here Thursday and taken by the buyers in an excited manner, from \$1.40 to \$1.15 per box. Another car of these Elbertas advertised for Monday will surely sell high, and the outlook for Colorado peaches is surely very good.

## CALIFORNIA PEARS RAPIDLY DIMINISH

The California Fruit Distributors have the following to say of the California fruit crop:

The following gives the number of cars of deciduous fruit shipped to all points by all members of this company for the week ending Monday night, September 14, 1909:

**Plums and prunes, 4 cars**—Shipment of this fruit is now so small that it is hardly quotable, but there are a few going forward each day.

**Peaches, 114 cars**—Shipment of peaches has remained practically the same as last week, but they are now nearly done. One week more will practically finish all varieties for the season of 1909.

**Pears, 48 cars**—As has been the case during the last two weeks, pear shipments have continued to decrease and will soon drop off entirely.

**Grapes, 693 cars**—Shipment of grapes has been heavier this last week than before and probably is now as heavy as it will be at any time during the season. There are few black grapes now available and they cannot be had except in limited quantities in mixed cars. There are a few Muscats still obtainable, but only in very small quantities. No straight cars can be had. Malagas are still going forward, but the movement is nearly over. The Tokay shipments are heavy and will continue in good volume until the end of the season unless interfered with sooner by adverse conditions. Weather has been very favorable and the fruit is coloring satisfactorily and is sweet. Dealers in western markets will be making a serious mistake if they do not send in their orders liberally, for this variety of fruit, as they never have been able to get a better article at more satisfactory prices. There should be a splendid demand, and we are satisfied that if the grape consuming public of the east could have an opportunity to buy this fruit at as reasonable prices as are justified by our f. o. b. quotations that the consumption of the same would be many times greater than ever before.
