SURVEYORS WORK SOUTH OF BEND

Camp Headquarters Removed Fifteen Miles Upstream Saturday.

BEND, Or., Sept. 21.—The Hill surveying camp, which has been located at Bend for about a month, Saturday moved 15 miles up the Deschutes to resume work at that point. The crew has been engaged in locating the preliminary survey for the Oregon Trunk line from Bend up the east bank of the river and across the lava beds abutting the Deschutes nine miles from town. This preliminary line has now been carried across the lava fields and the surveyors moved to the south side. Just how far the survey will be made southward is not known, but it is generally believed that Klamath Falls is the present objective. At all events another surveying crew went through to Odell some weeks ago, who are conducting the survey from that vicinity northward to connect with the one under way from Bend.

A third crew, which recently camped at Bend, is filling up the missing link between Redmond, the most southerly point of the central Oregon survey, and Bend. Once this is completed and the other two crews have joined forces near Odell, a line of prospective road will extend from the Columbia river southward for more than 200 miles. Thus far no terminals have been announced.

During the past week many rumors and reports were brought to Bend by those who have crossed the Cascades, relative to work now in progress on the Corvallis & Eastern line. It is maintained, and apparently upon good authority, that several miles of the old grade east from Detroit have been cleared of underbrush ready for rail laying, and that a party of surveyors are at work near the summit of the mountains.
