## OREGON APPLES IN DEMAND IN ORIENT

PORTLAND, Sept. 22.—"In the marketing of Oregon apples in the orient the problem now is not the creation of a demand for the goods, the opening up of markets, that has already been accomplished. The question that now confronts us is the finding of supplies for the demand that exists in the territory across the Pacific, where our apples are already known and their fame steadily extending."

That is the statement made by W. B. Glafke, one of the leading coast shippers of the fruit to the markets of the orient. Mr. Glafke says that in the few years Oregon apples have been going to China and Siberia a demand for the fruit has grown up that is likely to prove very difficult to adequately supply.

"In Vladivostok, Hongkong and half a dozen other trans-Pacific ports there is a strong and steadily growing demand for Oregon apples," he says, "and with the crop of this state already so heavily bought up for the Atlantic coast markets, the chances are that we will not be able to more than partially satisfy the trade across the Pacific this year. Our first shipment for the orient this season will leave the latter part of this month, and will consist for the most part of Kings and Baldwins. Orders are already on hand for large quantities of the fruit, and the buyers there are asking for Ortelys as well as the other sorts, but just now it doesn't look as if we would be able to send Ortelys to the orient in more than a very small way this year."

"We will probably send two or three times as many apples to the far east this year as we did last season, but even then there is small prospect of actually satisfying the demand. Vladivostok and Hongkong will be the principal shipping points. From these places the fruit will be distributed to hundreds of other coast and interior points. It goes without saying that the fruit sent across the Pacific will bring good prices."

In the local market for the time Kings and Gravensteins are the main items, and they are selling at prices ranging from \$1.25 to \$1.75 a box. Some of the later sorts will make their appearance soon, and the outlook is for a good trade in the fruit this fall and winter.

Of our two ears of Malagas, one showed some decay, our general average \$1.19.
