PORTABLE BOX BRINGS MAIL TO FARMER

EUGENE, Or., Sept. 23.—C. E. Shaul, living on rural route No. 3, has as unique a system of getting to his mail box, or rather of getting his mail box to him, as there is. Mr. Shaul has a wire stretched from his house to the mail box, suspended by two grooved wheels. The mail box travels along the wire, and is drawn back and forth by means of a windlass. When the mail carrier leaves the mail he turns up a small flag to show that he has been there. When Mr. Shaul's family see this they have only to step out on the porch and draw the box to them. The house is over a quarter of a mile from the road, and this carrier system saves over half a mile a day for the one who would have to go after the mail. The wire runs over the top of a hill.
