DESCHUTES ROADS BOTH PUSH WORK

Harriman Line Claims to Be Working Twelve Hundred Men, Same as Hill's.

THE DALLES, Or., Sept. 25.—H. A. Brandon, engineer in charge of the Deschutes road, who was recently here, says steam shovels are being moved in for heavy work, that the line is covered by 32 construction and 12 engineering camps; that 1200 men are employed; that track laying and bridging are to commence within a few days, and that four miles of grading work is completed.

Work on the Oregon Trunk is being pushed as hard as ever. About the same number of men as on the Deschutes Valley is employed. There is no abatement in supplies that are sent out of here regularly for Porter Brothers. Three loads of mules were sent from here for Porter Bros. yesterday.

PROHIBITIONISTS IN CELEBRATION

Fortieth Anniversary of That Party Honored Today in the City of Chicago.

CHICAGO, Sept. 25.—Prohibitionists from all parts of the country are assembled here in large numbers to take part in the celebration in honor of the 40th anniversary of the founding of the prohibition party, which began here yesterday and will culminate today in a monster parade in which, it is expected, fully 160,000 friends of prohibition will take part. The first day of the celebration was devoted to speechmaking and a general jollification. The program includes a prohibitionist meeting and a reception in the afternoon and a banquet of 1000 covers at the new Lasalle hotel in the evening.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25.—Nearer to the earth by 15,000,000 miles than it has been for 15 years, the planet Mars today is the object of immense interest to astronomers, particularly at the United States naval observatory here. Its average distance from the earth is 50,000,000 miles. Its distance from the earth today was only 35,000,000 miles. With this proximity, interest in the planet will become all the keener on account of the probability that new discoveries concerning matters Martian will be made.
