GOOD DEMAND FOR BEEF IN PORTLAND

On Sunday, September 26, by special permission of the Oregon railroad commission, through rates from Southern Pacific points in Oregon will apply on shipments of livestock destined to the Union stockyards at Stockdale. This will obviate the terminal charge now in effect, as the through rate is only slightly in excess of the rate to Portland.

The receipts at the Portland Union stockyards since the market opened on Wednesday, September 15, have been 1568 cattle, 1871 sheep, 2104 hogs and 154 calves.

Good to choice killing steers are quotable at \$4 to \$4.35, with a better price for something fancy. Good cows have brought \$3.25 while thin stuff sold as low as \$2. Sheep have been firm and in good demand. Fair to good have sold at \$4 to \$4.25. Lambs sold at \$5.50, with a demand for better quality at \$5.75. Hogs have been in active demand for good quality, while poor and half fat hogs have dragged. The top for the week has been \$8, while feeders have sold as low as \$6.50.

ENGLISH APPLE CROP IS LARGE

Consul Walter C. Hamm at Hull, England, writes of the British fruit market as follows:

The English apple crop this year promises to be unusually large, so that the home-grown apple will, to a degree, take the place of shipments from elsewhere, and apple shippers may find it advisable to keep back heavy exports until the bulk of the home supply has been cleared off the market. Apples come in large quantities from Australia and New Zealand in their seasons, so the market in this fruit is kept supplied all the year round. As many as 120,000 boxes of Tasmanian apples in a year have arrived in perfect condition in England.

These facts may help American exporters of fruit to judge how they can best dispose of their exports. The facilities Hull offers as a fruit market do not appear to be generally known in the United States, from which most shipments of fruit are made direct to Liverpool and Manchester for distribution. Hull, however, offers better advantages than either. It is also so near to the continent with which communication is so regular and ample, that fruit can be sent from here cheaply and easily to all continental ports.

The consumption of fruit in England has rapidly increased as the people have become better acquainted with the foreign products and it is taking the place of other foods. Large quantities of plums, apricots, apples, pears, currants, berries and bananas are being consumed.
