PRESENT STATUS OF CALIFORNIA CROPS

The California Fruit Distributors say regarding the status of the California fruit crop:

The following gives the number of cars of deciduous fruit shipped to all points by all members of this company for the week ending Monday night, September 27:

Peaches—Nine cars. There is still a very small quantity of peaches to go forward. Probably another week will witness the close of the season for this variety.

Pears—Thirty-three cars. Shipment of this fruit continues to dwindle and there are not more than ten or a dozen cars of the fruit left to go forward.

Grapes—515 cars. A comparison of the shipment of grapes for this week with that of last will show that there has been practically no difference in the two weeks as predicted in our last report. There is still plenty of fruit of this variety in California to go forward, and it improves in quality each day. Some of the finest fruit produced this season is yet to go forward and we are anticipating a cordial reception and good results for future shipments.

Weather—The first rain of the season materialized on Friday last. In the sections where the table grapes are grown in effect it amounted to little more than a heavy dew and we anticipate no damage whatsoever has resulted to the growing crop. It will, however, have a beneficial effect in increasing development of color and we feel that we are justified in anticipating it will result in gain rather than loss.

SENATE NICHE RESERVED FOR A ROOSEVELT BUST

WASHINGTON, Sept. 30.—Which will it be—Roosevelt presiding officer of the senate or Roosevelt as the great faunal naturalist? The joint committee on Library and Supt. of Capitol Elliott Woods have tentatively decided on a Roosevelt bust for one of the senate chamber niches, and the decision has been made known to James Earl Frazier, the New York sculptor. But Mr. Roosevelt himself will decide upon the design. Although Roosevelt presided over the senate only five days, from March 4 to March 9, 1901, in the special mission for the confirmation of the new McKinley cabinet, his bust will displace that of some older vice president.

When it is placed in position it will be the fourth living vice president to occupy a place, the others being Levi P. Morton, Adlai Stevenson and Charles W. Fairbanks.
