CONVICTED FORGER STARTS SCHOOL IN PRISON

GUTHRIE, Okla., October 5 .- The work of James O'Neil, an Oklahoman convict serving ten years for forgery, who has, on his own initiative, gathered the unlettered convicts in the penitentiary at McAlester into a school, teaching them bookkeeping and typewriting in addition to the common school branches, is to receive recognition from the state officials, and probably be regularly detailed as the teacher of the prison school. State Superintendant E. D. Cameron will endeavor to arrange for a regular organization of the school at the penitentiary, and the furnishing of the necessary books for conviets. There has been no organization so far except that voluntarily brought about by the prisoners, although there are 300 prisoners at Me Alester under twenty years of age, most of them practically unlettered.
