GRANTS PASS TO SHIP GRAPES

Movement of Fruit From Grants Pass District Will Be Active Soon.

PORTLAND, Oct. 6.—California grapes, which have for several weeks comprised the bulk of the supply in this market, will within a short time be largely displaced by southern Oregon products. Small shipments of Black Princes and a few other sorts are already coming in from Grants Pass, and the prospect is for fairly liberal offerings of Tokays, Malagas and other varieties from that section the latter part of this week and all of next.

Local fruit dealers say the output of the leading varieties of grapes in southern Oregon—most of them grown in the district of which Grants Pass is the center—will total at least a dozen cars this year, and it is said that the quality of the fruit will compare favorably with anything sent out of California. A. H. Carson, the pioneer and leading grape grower of southern Oregon, will have about half a dozen cars for the market this season, and he has so extended his vineyard that his crop promises to about double in size for the next two or three seasons. Mr. Carson has proved that grapes fully the equal of the California product can be successfully grown in this state.

The local market for the time is well supplied with California Tokays, Malagas and Blacks and Oregon Concord, but reduced receipts from the southern state are expected from this time on. A good deal of rain has fallen in California the past week, and this has seriously interfered with shipping. The supply there also is not what it was a few weeks ago. No changes in quotations on Californians were announced today, but local Concord were lower, going generally at 20 to 25 cents a basket. The Concord thus far brought in were of good quality and have sold well.
