MARKET CONDITIONS IN NEW YORK CITY

Rae & Hatfield, under date of October 1, issued the following New York deciduous market letter:

Although this was not a holiday here, all the receivers, excepting ourselves, took it into their heads to go on an excursion up the river to see the Newburgh part of the Hudson-Fulton celebration. They did this, shutting down their business, notwithstanding the good demand prevailing for grapes the past two days. The town at present is full of visitors and all hotels are crowded. They also took the chance of their fruit arriving today, deteriorating in condition, and the visitors leaving New York the end of this week.

Market ruled strong. Florin ear showing irregular color, averaged for Tokays, \$1.31; Cornichons, \$1.50; Woodbridge Tokays, mostly small, rather dead appearance, \$1.17; Tokays from Fresno, greenish, \$1.31.

Malagas were in fair condition and sold high, averaging \$1.36; the best average for Malagas for a long time. Car of winter pears sold well, B. Clairgean averaging \$2.70; Howells, \$2.08; P. Barrys, \$2.37 1/2.

Few Coe's late red plums sold for \$1.25. Expect a heavy offering here here Monday, our portion consisting of 16 cars.

WRONGED POSTMASTER RIGHTE DAFTER DEATH

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—The government has finally located an heir to the estate of Postmaster George Weart, of Deal Beach, N. J., to whom the postal department owes \$10.

While Mr. Weart was postmaster at Deal Beach in 1905 a registered package valued at \$10 was reported lost, and he was forced to make good the loss. Subsequently it was discovered that the package had been delivered to the addressee.

After retiring from office Mr. Weart went west and shortly afterward died. For nearly four years the department has been searching for his heirs in order to refund the \$10.

A few days ago the Associated Press sent out a story of the search. Today the department received from James T. Weart of Portland, Or., a communication stating that he is a son of the former Postmaster Weart and administrator of his estate. The \$10 will be forwarded to him at once.
