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HANNA SUSTAINS INJUNCTION

HANLEY STILL BARS CITY FROM ENTERING ON RANCH

CASE WILL NOW BE CARRIED TO SUPREME COURT FOR HEARING

Hanna Refuses to Grant Motion of City Attorney To Dissolve Injunction Stopping City From Continuing Work on Gravity Pipeline

Judge H. K. Hanna of the circuit court on Monday morning overruled the motion offered by City Attorney Porter J. Neff to dissolve the injunction restraining the city from entering upon the premises of M. F. Hanley on Little Butte creek and laying the gravity water line. The case will now be carried to the supreme court. Until a decision is received there the city will be forced to suspend all work when the line is completed to the Hanley ranch, which will be within the next few days.

For many weeks the citizens of Medford have awaited with much interest for Judge Hanna's decision in the case, for it is of vital importance to the city of Medford. Now the city must await such time as the case can be decided in the supreme court of the state.

One of the interesting features of the case will be the testing of the validity of the statute under which Governor Benson issued orders to Judge John S. Coke of the Second district to come to this district and hold a term of court to try the case. If this statute is unconstitutional, as Attorney A. E. Reames contends, then Judge Coke will be out of a job.

It will be remembered that Judge Coke came to this district and held a special term of court and a jury awarded Mr. Hanley \$600 damages. This judgment was held up by Attorney Reames, who secured a temporary injunction preventing the city from entering upon the land. A motion to dissolve by Attorney Neff has just been overruled.

CRATER PARK NOW HEMMED WITH MARKERS

Geological Survey Completes Work of Making Boundaries—Iron Posts Each Half Mile.

ENGINEER CHAPMAN STRONG FOR LARGER APPROPRIATION

Says Lake Should No Longer Be Least Known of National Wonders in U. S.

Pearson Chapman, a member of the geological survey corps of the United States, has completed the work of marking the boundaries of the Crater national park. He arrived in Medford Sunday and left for Portland.

In accordance with instructions sent out by the department, Mr. Chapman placed iron posts every half mile along the boundary of the park with cement blocks at the corners and at each entrance.

"It is a shame," stated Mr. Chapman, "that congress only appropriates \$3000 a year for the development of the Crater national park. Twenty-five thousand should be the appropriation and the lake should no longer remain one of the least known wonders of the United States."

COAL FROM CASCADE MINE OF SPLENDID QUALITY

The first load of coal from the Cascade coal mine was brought to Medford by Contractor C. Stambaugh Saturday afternoon. The coal is of very good character, easily the best fuel yet taken from any of the coal mines, and as the coal is taken out in development work, it will be marketed here as fuel.

The Cascade is the furthest north of the three coal properties owned by the syndicate headed by Colonel J. F. Mundy and is considered by many the most promising of all. A double track tunnel is being driven into the coal, which has a working face of between seven and eight feet of good commercial coal.

Colonel Mundy returned from Portland Monday and states that development work on the Cascade will be continued steadily.

Many district exhibits will be entered. Wenatchee enters 200 boxes, as does Yakima. Other districts will be Hood River, British Columbia, Montana and eastern Washington.

The association will pay for cold storage, care, etc., of the exhibits. It will be a case of first come first served for location.

"We expect to have a better show than ever," says Mr. Finley. "Many matters which marred the first exhibition have been done away with. I trust there will be no hitch in arrangements to have this valley represented."

The fry were received upon application made by the association last winter. Fifteen thousand were booked for Woodville, but as no one was on hand to take care of the little fish, they were brought on to Medford.

The fry were dumped in the Little Butte above Brownsboro. Rainbow and Skagit River steelhead fry applied for at the same time have not been received as yet.

TO STUDY CRATER NATIONAL FOREST

BOLD ROBBER AT WORK IN SEATTLE

Enters Express Office and Gets Away With Gold and Currency—Gags Clerks.

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 11.—Every available detective in this city is seeking a trace of the lone bandit who at midnight bound and gagged the chief night clerk of the Great Northern Express at King street station and also his assistant and carried off several sacks of gold coin, also a large amount of paper money, totaling over \$2000.

The robber was heavy set and wore a m.l.k. The office was in charge of Chief Clerk William Simonson. His assistant, I. P. White, had gone out to lunch when the robber entered, pulled a gun on Simonson and tied him. He first made him open the vaults. Shortly afterwards White returned. The robber, undismayed, bound and gagged the assistant and then left. The detectives believe that he got away with over \$2000.

The man hunt will be resumed by the sheriffs of three counties tomorrow. Supplies in automobiles will be moved forward.

TAFT REACHES LOS ANGELES; INSPECTS FORTIFICATIONS
