An ordinance providing for the construction of a trunk sewer on East Main street from Bear Creek to Genesee street, in the city of Medford, Oregon, and for the assessment of the cost thereof on adjacent property and providing a meeting of the council to consider protests against said construction and assessment and the serving of the owners of adjacent property with notice thereof.

The city of Medford doth ordain as follows:

Section 1. It is the intention of the council to cause an 8-inch trunk sewer to be constructed along East Main street from Bear Creek to Genesee street, in the city of Medford, Oregon, and to assess the cost thereof upon the property directly benefited by and adjacent to said sewer, in proportion to its frontage thereon.

Section 2. The council will hear and consider any protests against said construction and the assessing of said property for the cost thereof at a meeting of the council to be held October 22d, 1909, at 7:30 p. m. in the council chamber in said city, and all owners of adjacent property are hereby called upon to appear before said council at said time and place and show cause if any they have, why such construction should not be made and the cost thereof so assessed.

Section 3. The city recorder is hereby directed to serve notice thereof upon the property owners aforesaid, by posting three copies of this ordinance in three public places in said city and publishing this ordinance once in a daily newspaper published and of general circulation in said city at least ten days before the date of meeting.

ORDINANCE NO. 241.
An ordinance providing for the construction of a 12-inch trunk sewer on Genesee street from East Main street to Washington street, in the city of Medford, Oregon, and for the assessment of the cost thereof on adjacent property and providing a meeting of the council to consider protests against said construction and assessment and the serving of the owners of adjacent property with notice thereof.

The city of Medford doth ordain as follows:

Section 1. It is the intention of the council to cause a 12-inch trunk sewer to be constructed along Genesee street from East Main street to Washington street, in the city of Medford, Oregon, and to assess the cost thereof upon the property directly benefited by and adjacent to said sewer, in proportion to its frontage thereon.

Section 2. The council will hear and consider any protests against said property for the cost thereof at a meeting of the council to be held October 22d, 1909, at 7:30 p. m. in the council chamber in said city, and all owners of adjacent property are hereby called upon to appear before said council at said time and place and show cause if any they have, why such construction should not be made and the cost thereof so assessed.

An ordinance providing for the construction of a sewer on West Second street from Holly street to west city limits, in the city of Medford, Oregon, and for the assessment of the cost thereof on adjacent property and providing a meeting of the council to consider protests against said construction and assessment and the serving of the owners of adjacent property with notice thereof.

The city of Medford doth ordain as follows:

Section 1. It is the intention of the council to cause a sewer to be constructed on West Second street from Holly street to west city limits, to be 8-inch from Holly street to Olson street and remainder to be 6-inch, in the city of Medford, Oregon, and to assess the cost thereof upon the property directly benefited by and adjacent to said sewer, in proportion to its frontage thereon.

The council will hear and consider any protests against said construction and the assessing of said property for the cost thereof at a meeting of the council to be held October 22d, 1909, at 7:30 p. m. in the council chamber in said city, and all owners of adjacent property are hereby called upon to appear before said council at said time and place and show cause if any they have, why such construction should not be made and the cost thereof so assessed.

The city recorder is hereby directed to serve notice thereof upon the property owners aforesaid, by posting three copies of this ordinance in three public places in said city and publishing this ordinance once in a daily newspaper published and of general circulation in said city at least ten days before the date of meeting.

An ordinance providing for the construction of a 14-inch trunk sewer on Washington street and Washington street, Extended from Genesee street to a point 100 feet west of the west bank of Bear creek and

thence as nearly as practicable in a straight line to the main trunk sewer of the city at the intersection of Riverside avenue and Maple street, in the city of Medford, Oregon, and for the assessment of the cost thereof on adjacent property and providing a meeting of the council to consider protests against said construction and assessment and the serving of the owners of adjacent property with notice thereof.

The city of Medford doth ordain as follows:

Section 1. It is the intention of the council to cause a 14-inch trunk sewer to be constructed along Washington street and Washington street, Extended, from Genesee street to a point 100 feet west of the west bank of Bear creek and thence as nearly as practicable in a straight line to the main trunk sewer of the city at the extension of Riverside avenue and Maple street, and to assess the cost thereof upon the property directly benefited thereby and adjacent thereto said trunk sewer, being designed to draw and specially benefit the whole of sewer district No. 11 of said city.

Section 2. The council will hear and consider any protests against said construction and the assessing of said property for the cost thereof at a meeting of the council to be held October 22d, 1909, at 7:30 p. m. in the council chamber in said city, and all owners of adjacent property are hereby called upon to appear before said council at said time and place and show cause if any they have, why such construction should not be made and the cost thereof so assessed.

Section 3. The city recorder is hereby directed to serve notice thereof upon the property owners aforesaid, by posting three copies of this ordinance in three public places in said city and publishing this ordinance once in a daily newspaper published and of general circulation in said city at least ten days before the date of meeting.
