

OPEN SEASON FOR QUAIL ON FRIDAY

The open season for quail begins next Friday, the 15th, and hunters should get wise to the restrictions of the law with regard to this game bird. It should be noted that shooting from any public highway is forbidden, and it is not permissible to shoot within any enclosed property without the permission of the owner.

The section on quail reads as follows: "It shall be unlawful within the county of Jackson and Josephine to hunt, pursue, take, kill, injure, destroy or have in possession, except for scientific or breeding purposes, or to sell or offer for sale, barter or exchange, any quail at any time between the 15th day of December of each year and the 15th day of October of the following year, and it shall be unlawful in said counties during the open season and when it is lawful to hunt or kill the same, to kill, capture, destroy or have in possession any greater number than ten of the game birds enumerated in this section in any one day or more than 20 of said birds in any seven consecutive days. (L. 1909, p. 417.)"

The limit is placed at five in one day and ten in one week.

HILL'S ENGINEERS ARE ALONG WILLOW CREEK

MADRAS, Oct. 12.—The crew of Oregon Trunk engineers which arrived in Madras this week started to work this morning, after fitting up camping quarters and are now making the final location of the Oregon Trunk line down Willow creek canyon. These has been two other surveys made by the Hill line down Willow creek, and this last will be very thorough as to data concerning character of work and cost of construction. This crew will make the location only to the Deschutes canyon. Their location work will be followed by cross-sectioning and setting grade stakes, and it is also reported that they will locate sidings and switches for the station grounds at Madras before leaving this vicinity.

Railway engineers who have formerly been identified with the Oregon Trunk say that some of the most expensive work on the central Oregon road will be found in the Willow creek canyon.

Public sentiment without any change in the law can compel assessors and boards of equalization to assess idle lands three times what they are now figured at on the assessment rolls.

Tillamook has set aside \$90,000 to be expended on road work this year.

THOUSAND DOLLARS IN PRIZES FOR FARMERS

One thousand dollars in cash prizes have been offered by James J. Hill for the best specimens of dry farming products grown in Montana, Oregon and Washington. There are also three handsome sterling silver cups for agricultural exhibits on non-irrigated districts. The entries for these prizes must come from farms within 25 miles of the Great Northern railway lines in the three states named. Wheat, oats, barley, rye, flax, field peas, alfalfa seed and potatoes are to be displayed in peck quantities. Sheaf exhibits of grains and hay are also desirable. These prizes will be awarded at the national dry farming congress to be held at Billings, Mont., October 26, 27 and 28. Mr. Hill is a friend of the farmer and offers these prizes to stimulate interest in the possibilities of the arid regions of the northwest.
