OPEN SEASON FOR QUAIL ON FRIDAY

The open season for quail begins the law with regard to this game bird. It should be noted that shooting from any public highway is forbidden, and it is not permissible to shoot within any enclosed property without the permission of the owner.

The section on quail reads as follows: "It shall be unlawful within the county of Jackson and Josephine to hunt, pursue, take, kill, injure, destroy or have in possession, evcept for scientific or breeding purposes, or to sell or offer for sale, barter or exchange, any quail at any time between the 15th day of December of each year and the 15th day of October of the following year, and it shall be unlawful in said counties during the open senson and when it is lawful to hunt or kill the same, to kill, capture, destroy or have in pos- to their new field at Canyonville. session any greater number than ten They have many sincere friends, who of the game birds enumerated in this regret their departure, and wish them last week, section in any one day or more than 20 of said birds in any seven consecutive days.
