### BIG PRICES FOR OREGON HOP CROP

Light Yield Sends Market Up—Hibernians to Meet in Portland Next Year—Cement Works.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 12.—Hop growers are having their earnings, with the prevailing quotation for the Oregon crop at 25 cents per pound. The average price last year was seven cents, in 1907, seven cents and in 1906 12 cents. The last high priced year was 1904, when the Oregon hop went to 45 cents and away back in 1882 there were sales as high as \$1.25 per pound. In some respects the market this year resembles that of 1882.

Light crops all over the world are responsible for the prevailing high prices. The Oregon crop is the lightest since 1896. The estimate of 70,000 bales for the year's yield in this state is considered about right, with Washington's crop 15,000 bales, compared with 17,000 bales last year, and California has about 60,000 bales this year compared to 68,000 bales last season.

It is expected this year will mark the first of series of high priced crops. This year, the next and possibly one or two more, will mean

large profits to growers. After that, because of high prices having stimulated production, more hops will be grown than are needed and the price will drop again.

### FREE EXHIBITION OF EXPERT FANCY SHOOTING

### DRY ISSUE UP IN SISKIYOU COUNTY

Board of Supervisors Adopt Resolutions Submitting Prohibition Question to Voters.

YREKA, Cal., Oct. 12.—Resolutions have been adopted by the board of supervisors of Siskiyou county as follows:

Resolved, That on November 23, 1909, an election be held in Siskiyou county allowing non-residents of incorporated towns to vote upon the following questions:

First—Shall Siskiyou county grant license to sell liquor.

Second—Shall vote be considered as cast as per precinct or county?

Third—Shall saloons be allowed to continue under strict regulations?

Resolved, That no one be allowed to vote unless a resident of Siskiyou county and that his name appear upon the last great register of said county. Resolutions were signed by chairman and secretary of board.

There are 14 saloons in Yreka and many in the county.

Meetings of taxpayers are being held in Coos county to consider better roads.
