SNAP GOES OUT OF PEAR MARKET

Sgobel & Day Sell Six Cars d'Anjous From Yakima and Medford, Giv- Latter Worst of It.

Sgobel & Day sent out the following New York letter dated October 6:

One hundred and twenty-nine cars of deciduous fruit auctioned here in past three days, the great bulk of same being grapes from California.

Prunes—13 carloads have been sold, making the following averages: Emmett, \$1.38; Boise, \$1.32; Eugene, 65c.

The car from Eugene was in very rotten condition, but the Idaho Italians were all sound, although not hard, as in past years. Market today a shade lower than earlier in the week because our buyers dare not put away in cold storage there Italians to keep for a few weeks. The demand is very good, especially as the weather is so very favorable.

Pears—Six cars d'Anjous sold as follows: From Yakima, \$5.87 to \$3.25 per box, average \$5.11; from Yakima, \$4.75 to \$2 per box, average \$3.11; from Yakima, \$3.05 to \$2.45 per box, average \$2.68; from Medford, \$4.50 to \$3 per box, average \$3.83; from Medford, \$3.62 to \$2.50 per half box, average \$2.74; from Medford, \$3.12 to \$2 per half box, average \$2.53.

With the exception of one car from Yakima, sold today, the others were all handsome and were taken lively.

We also sold our last car Santa Clara Comice in half boxes, making an average of \$2.47, and we must confess there is not the snap to the market for pears that there was a while ago; however the prices have been abnormally high, as you know from our reports to you. We still have two more d'Anjous from Medford to sell, and shortly expect to open the ball with Comice from Medford, of which we have several cars rolling, and expect to find them of very high grade. Our friends are coming on from Boston, Philadelphia and Baltimore to attend these sales of ours.

Peaches—Three cars of Elbertas have been sold since Monday, averages \$1.10, \$1.07 and \$1.05. The fruit was very good, but we are still receiving peaches from western New York, however after this week we look for much better figures.

Apples—Barrels of fancy reds have advanced rapidly, and extras are worth today \$5 to \$4 per barrel. Weather is superb, clear and cool.

Rae & Hatfield's Report.

Rae & Hatfield, under date of New York, October 7, report as follows:

Weather fine and warm. Only fair attendance at sale.

Grapes again predominated, especially Tokays, and with the weather conditions unfavorable for grapes and the trade having stocks on hand, the market ruled very weak all through sale. Florin Tokays averaged \$1.08 and \$1.01. Lodi, 85c; Woodbridge, 93c; Vacaville, 80c; Neweastle, 75c; general average, 90c. Malagas sold from 75c to \$1.12½, mostly 90c to \$1.12½. Muscats averaged \$1.17; Cornichons from Newcastle, 78c.

Half boxes of California Comice sold from \$1.50 to \$1.80. Few half boxes of Oregon (Bear Creek) sold \$2.12½ to \$2.67½; boxes, \$2.87½ to \$4.
