BIG MONEY MADE IN OREGON HOGS

Stockyards Manager Shows Avenue Where Gold Awaits

Farmer.

PORTLAND. Oct. 14.—"Oregon farmers should raise hogs if they want to make money fast," said D. O. Lively, general agent of the Portland Union stocyyards, "Oregon is peculiarly adapted to raising hogs, and wheat judiciously fed to the pork ers, can be mad eto bring from \$1 to \$1.25 a bushel.

"Oregon grass or alfalfa is good feed for the hogs while they are growing, and the wheat need only be used in hardening the flesh while the animals are being prepared for market. An idea prevails that because little corn is raised in the northwest that the fattening of hogs is not profitable, and this idea must be gotten rid of, as there is no real foundation for the belief.

"Hogs for the market are very carce, because the business of hograising has been neglected. Heavy importations of pork and bacon from the east have been the result, with the consequent high prices for such

"Poor hogs can be obtained now at 5 cents a pound, while fat hogs bring 8 cents. The farmer who buys n poor hog and adds 100 pounds to its weight can, by the expenditure of \$3 for feed, realize \$8 for the additional weight and 3 cents on the original weight of the hog within a short time."

The following gives the number of [cars of deciduous fruit shipped to all points by all members of the California Fruit Distributors for the week (seven days) ending Monday night. October 11:

Pears, nine ears-A few cars of this fruit still continue to appear on our report, and next week's report may show a few more.

Grapes, 292 cars-Owing to the had weather prevailing last week, the the shipment of this fruit has shown a material decrease. Now, however, the weather is good again, and it is expected that the movement will soon reach normal proportions. Tokays are showing very good color and size, and in this respect leave nothing to be desired.

Since our last letter reports have reached this office concerning the Emperor grape crop, and they are of not so encouraging a nature as those previously received. The crop will not be as large as has been expected, neither will the proportion of fancy fruit be as large as we hoped

Cornichon grapes continue to develop finely, and are improving in quality every day.

Weather Since our last letter the weather has been satisfactory in every respect. It is warm and pleasant and mild winds are moving the moisture of last week's precipitation in the best manner possible for the good of the fruit. With no further adverse weather conditions we expect to finish the season in good shape and to the satisfaction of all consumers of this splendid fruit. There has been a material improvement in the prices received at anetion, and with the lessened quantity of eastern fruit with which we will have to compete from this time on a higher range of values may be expected.
