BULLETIN OUT ON PEACH SPOT

Oregon Agricultural College Sums Up Result of Their Investigations.

The Oregon Agricultural College after conducting investigations regarding spraying for peach fruit spot have issued a bulletin in which the following conclusions are summed up:

1. Peach fruit spot probably causes a loss to the peach and apricot growers of Oregon greater than that caused by all other peach diseases.
2. The two season's work has demonstrated conclusively that the disease can be practically eliminated from an orchard spraying.
3. Good results can be obtained by spraying either with Bordeaux mixture or with lime-sulphur solution. The results so far are slightly in favor of the Bordeaux.
4. Some danger to foliage accompanies summer spraying with either Bordeaux or lime-sulphur. Therefore care should be exercised in preparing the spray and not using it too strong.
5. The fall application seems to be more efficient than any other single one. It should be made as soon as possible after the late fruit is gathered. If San Jose scale is present lime-sulphur (1 to 10 or 12) should be used; if not Bordeaux may be used if preferred. This fall application is beneficial also in controlling the peach twig blight. It is possible that one annual fall spraying may be all that is necessary to control the twig blight and the fruit spot.
6. Spraying just as the buds are swelling in spring is useless as a preventative of peach fruit-spot. This however is the most important application for the control of the peach leaf curl and should not be omitted if this disease has been prevalent.
7. Peach fruit-spot attacks the fruit between about May 10 and June 15.
8. The first spring spraying, therefore should be done about May 10; the second about June 1. If the disease has been unusually prevalent, or if rainy weather to the growth of the fungus occurs, then second application may be made about May 20 to 25 and a third one about June 5 to 10.

NEW RULES OUT FOR MORTALITY STATISTICS

More Complete Statistics Regarding Deaths Will Hereafter Be Made.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—United States Census Director E. Dana Durand today promulgated new rules and instructions for the purpose of securing more complete and accurate transcripts of deaths occurring in the selected death registration states and cities of the United States. These transcripts are obtained every month by the census bureau from nearly all of the city and state registrars in the census death registration area and they form the basis of the mortality statistics prepared by the division of vital statistics, under Chief Statistician Dr. Cressley L. Wilbur.

This action is expected to result in the presentation of the most scientific and trustworthy mortality statistics ever compiled in connection with a decennial United States census, which affords the population bases for the 1910 death rates. In addition to this important step toward more reliable data, the new revised version of the classification of the causes of death, as adopted at the Paris conference for the second decennial revision of the international classification, will go into effect January 1 next, in the census registration area. Supplementing these will be the use of the new United States standard death certificates, which it is believed the organized registration officials forming the vital statistic section of the American Public Health association will adopt for the report of deaths commencing January 1 next at the Richmond, Va., meeting, October 19-22 next.
