MUGH PROGRESS ON KLAMATH PROJECT

Three Gangs of Foreign Laborers Are Shipped From Portland to Give Sufficient Help.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—Owing to favorable weather conditions, construction work on the Klamath project proceeded rapidly during September. Three gangs of foreign laborers were shipped in from Portland to make up for scarcity in the local supply.

During September the drainage work on the first unit was completed and the force of men was transferred to the south end of Clear Lake, where work was commenced on the dikes. The site has been cleared of rocks, the surface plowed and a cutoff trench under the earth portion of the embankment has been excavated.

As water cannot be obtained from wells, it will be brought in wagons from the lake, a distance of one and a half miles. Work has been begun on the rock fill portion, the most important feature of the dike system. On the Clear Lake dam the excavation amounted to 14,000 cubic yards, while 8000 yards of rock and 6500 yards of earth embankment were completed. A large amount of concrete work on the outlet and gate towers was finished. The Clear Lake dam is now about 85 per cent completed.

Two field parties have finished topographic work on the low line canal in Langell valley. Other parties have been working on topography in the lower lake marshes, and on south side of Klamath river between Keno and the straits, and another party will soon begin similar work near Midland.

JOSEPHINE COUNTY WORTH 10 MILLIONS

Has 20,000 Acres Under Cultivation and 400,000 Acres of Untilled Land.

GRANTS PASS, Or., Oct. 18.—Josephine county has in round numbers 20,000 acres under a high state of cultivation, and in uncultivated land about 400,000 acres. This enormous amount of untilled land is used for grazing, but much of it can be cleared and farmed. Some of it is good fruit land, and all that is needed is more population to make it as valuable as the present land under cultivation.

The Southern Pacific company has 36.92 miles of railway and the company will have to pay this year at the rate of \$35,000 per mile on the roadbed and \$3000 on rolling stock. The telegraph and telephone companies are assessed at \$69,360. In all the assessor's rounds over the county he and his deputies found but 11 dogs upon which the owners will have to pay taxes. The gross value of these 11 dogs was fixed at \$210. The gross value of all property in Josephine county is approximately \$10,000,000.

CITY OF ASHLAND IS AFTER NON PAYING POLL TAX MEN
Tidings: Street Commissioner Frayley has filed complaints in the local justice court for the collection of poll road taxes from a dozen or more residents of Ashland, whom it is set up in complaints, have refused upon demand the \$3 poll road tax provided by the city charter to be paid by the citizens liable therefor. These it is stated, are only the start in the carrying out of the policy of the city authorities to strictly enforce the collection of these poll road taxes, and that suits will be instituted in every case no matter who the party is, where the demands of the street commissioner are refused. The law is very specific in the matter of making and enforcing these collections.
