Three Gangs of Foreign Laborers Are Has 20,000 Acres Under Cultivation Shipped From Portland to Give Sufficient Help.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18 .- Owing to favorable weather conditions, construction work on the Klamath project proceeded rapidly during September. Three gangs of foreign laborers were shipped in from Portland to make up for scarcity in the local supply.

During September the drainage work on the first unit was completed and the force of men was transferred to the south end of Clear Lake, where work was commenced on the dikes.
