SURE TO LAND \$50,000 PRIZE

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Oct. 19.—Euphorism over the prospects of getting together the \$50,000 fund proposed as a measure for making the Sacramento valley notorious in the east, notorious that is for its fine crops and unlimited opportunities for money-making, was the distinguishing feature of a meeting of the executive committee of the Sacramento Valley Development association today.

Reports brought in by the directors of the association from valley points all gave assurance that the fund will be filled up. Eight of the 11 counties in Superior California levied a two-cent tax as a contribution to the fund, which means in round numbers \$16,000, and the Northern Electric volunteered \$10,000 more, making \$26,000 in sight. Other subscriptions have been promised since then, but the directors are keeping the names of the promises low for reasons of policy. But they say there's no doubt about corraling the whole amount and when it is captured a statement will be issued.

The first steps toward a formal celebration of the arrival of a Western Pacific train were taken. The time is getting short now, as the first train is promised for the middle of next month. Marshall Diggs, the chairman, was authorized to appoint a committee of five to co-operate with the other civic organizations in the arrangements for a celebration.
