MATLOCK'S SON IS IN TROUBLE; INSANITY CHARGED

EUGENE, Or., Oct. 21.—Joseph Matlock, son of J. D. Matlock, mayor of Eugene, is in jail here charged with a statutory offense against Clara Nirchli, a 17-year-old girl, having been bound over by Judge Bryon of the justice court yesterday afternoon in the sum of \$1000. It is alleged that young Matlock attacked the girl on a dark street a few nights ago. Before the examination Matlock's brother filed a charge of insanity against him. He will be examined on that charge Friday. Matlock is married, his wife being with her mother in Portland. He was arrested a few years ago on a similar charge, and was placed under bonds, but left the city, forfeiting the bonds. Upon his return about a year ago the charge was not pressed against him.

ALL OF ROOSEVELT PARTY IS ILL EXCEPT TEDDY

NAIVASHA, British East Africa, Oct. 21.—Colonel Roosevelt, accompanied by R. J. Cunningham, the hunter and guide, arrived here today. All the members of the expedition are well.

Edmund Heller, the zoologist, returned last night, having ascended Mount Kenia to a height of 10,000 feet. Mr. Heller said that Major Edgar A. Mearns would continue the ascent, hoping to reach a height of 15,000 feet. Mount Kenia is an extinct volcano, rising 17,200 feet.
