APPLES ARE STRONG; PEAR PRICES WEAK

Sgobel & Day report as follows on the apple outlook in New York:

Apples—Market holds very strong. We paid \$4.50 per barrel for 400 barrels of Ben Davis to go to South America. Ben Davis, remember, a few more cars of Jonathans from Wenatchee and Colorado have arrived, and almost all sold \$3.25 to \$3 per box. Strong market ahead on apples.

Pears—Moderate offerings, but the market certainly is not so strong.

From Wenatchee, d'Anjou, boxes averaged \$3.17; from North Yakima, \$3.11; Medford Comice seconds averaged \$3; Medford Comice half boxes \$2.65.

These were the only pears from the northwest sold here this week. The d'Anjous were not as fine as some we had earlier, or they would have brought more money. The half boxes Comice in the car offered were very handsome, but were withdrawn and stored.

As to California pears, all to our care from Santa Clara sold as follows: 1 car half boxes Winter Nelis, fine, averaged \$2.10 1 car half boxes G. Moreau, fine, averaged \$1.25; part car half boxes P. Barry, fine, averaged \$2; part car Clairegeau, fine, averaged \$1.41.

London market is higher, and we are sending there today four cars of California Winter Nelis, Glout Moreau and Easter Buerre, relieving this market just to that extent, in fact there are very few more cars California pears to be offered here. Same are all in half boxes, Winter Nelis, Glout Moreau and Easter Buerre. We have several cars of Medford Comice here waiting, some of which we shall offer next week, and will report to you.

CATTLE BRINGING HIGH PRICES IN PORTLAND

UNION STOCKYARDS, Stockdale, Oct. 22.—Cattle are bringing higher prices today than ever before in the history of the local market for this time of the year. Steers are selling as high as \$4.75, while good cows have moved in the yards during the past 24 hours as high as \$3.60.

Stock that brought these big values were of course out of the ordinary, but the transactions indicate that there is a market here for livestock showing better quality than has been received heretofore.

Cows that bring \$3.60 are not shown in the yards every day of the week, and therefore credit for bringing in such good stuff naturally goes to the shipper, S. S. Stearns of Shaniko is the one who sent in the latest cattle of merit, and everyone in the yards, buyers and sellers alike, wish that there were more like him. S. & S. took the highest priced cows at \$3.60, there being a carload of this grade. The same killers likewise took a load of steers at \$4.75, the top notch for recent transactions. The Union Meat company took a car of steers that ranged in price from \$4.75 down to \$4.35.

HOOD RIVER APPLES BRING AS HIGH AS \$3.35

HOOD RIVER, Or., Oct. 22.—The prices paid this season for Hood River apples by Steinhart & Kelly of New York break all previous records. The highest price ever paid for Hood River apples up to two years ago was paid by the Davidson Fruit company of this city, when they bought the entire Hood River crop and paid \$3.27 1/2 per box for the fancy Spitzenbergs. The price paid this year by the New York firm was \$3.35 for the fancy Spitzenbergs. The Yellow Newtowns brought \$2.40 per box, which is far in excess of any price ever paid for Newtowns in the world in the raw market. Fancy Baldwins brought \$1.90 and Ortleys \$2.25. The second grade apples also brought a high figure. The prices paid for this grade were nearly as high as that paid for fancy stock grown in other districts. The prices published for the Wenatchee stock are about \$1 per box below the Hood River price. Apples at the rate of three to four cars are going out from here each day for the New York market.
