The spirit of progress has completely dominated the school affairs of Talent. The only desire is to have better schools than heretofore. At a special meeting held in July the matter of consolidation of the different districts in the vicinity of Talent was considered by a vote of those present and was decided in favor of consolidation. The argument presented was that better schools could be had by uniting than otherwise. It was ascertained that to settle the matter of consolidation it had to be brought before the regular annual meeting in June. In September the matter of admitting the ninth grade into schools was submitted to the voters and carried.

In the effort to improve the school considerable expense to the district has been required. The school district of Talent has a bonded indebtedness. In order to unite with the other districts on equal terms this indebtedness must be paid off. To admit

the ninth grade required the expense of a new teacher. When the fall term of school opened it was found that the present school building was not large enough to accommodate the pupils and the building of an addition to the school house became a necessity. By their votes the taxpayers of the district have cheerfully shown that in order to improve the school they are willing to meet the financial obligations. The teachers have shown that they are governed by the spirit of the times and are putting forth their best efforts in the work, by impressing upon the minds of the pupils the great efforts the taxpayers are making in their behalf. The eighth grade and especially the ninth grade pupils have shown by their actions that they appreciate and feel grateful to the citizens of Talent for their willingness to give them educational advantages. The entertainment just given is only a preliminary affair and the teachers and the pupils are arranging to have a better and much larger entertainment, the proceeds to be used for the purpose of purchasing supplies for the school.
