

PICTURES TAKEN FOR CENTRAL POINT BOOK

Official Photographer Spends Much Time in Getting Views of Nearby City.

J. T. Miller of McCloud, Cal., official photographer of the Southern Pacific company, was in Central Point last Thursday and Friday securing photographs of the town and surrounding orchards and scenery for use in the forthcoming Central Point book, says the Herald. Mayor Leever and W. H. Norcross, who had been appointed by the club to take Mr. Miller around the valley and to assist him in securing suitable views spent two days in scouring the country in his company in Mr. Norcross' White Steamer and the result is a number of the finest views ever taken in the valley. From the top of Mr. Orloff's house well up on the foothills west of town, Mr. Miller secured a fine panoramic view of the town and valley, with Mount McLaughlin and Table Rock well defined in the distance. Panoramic views were also taken from the schoolhouse tower showing the town and valley to the northward and one from the top of the old school building showing the Snowy Butte orchard and a fine view of the valley to the southward.

Many individual views of orchards, fruit trees laden with fruit, buildings, etc., were also taken which Mr. Miller says comprises a set of as fine pictures as he has ever taken for a similar purpose.

SCHUMANN-HEINK URGES "ONE BIG, SIMPLE RELIGION"

CHICAGO, Oct. 29.—Mrs. Ernestine Schumann-Heink was stunned today when told that the Highland Park bank robber, who killed himself rather than be captured, was her friend, Lamar A. Harris of Los Angeles.

"Gott," the singer exclaimed, striking a dramatic attitude. "You know, there ought to be a great religion to keep people from doing things like that. There ought to be just one religion—not churches, not Protestants and Catholics and Mohammedans and all that—one big religion all over the world—one big, simple religion. The principles—the truth—at the bottom of all religions are the same.

"Oh, there ought to be men going about the world all the time like detectives watching for people that do not understand what it means—a big, simple religion that can make us forget all petty and ignoble things and make us remember only what is great and good and kind and beautiful.

"Sometimes a church is good—when you feel all fall in love—she laid her hand over her heart—and you want a kind of an outlet for your feelings. But nature—that is the true church."

SHIPPERS WILL FIGHT IF RATES ARE INCREASED

CINCINNATI, Oct. 29.—Fifty representative manufacturers and business men of 12 states met here recently to enter a formal protest against the general increase of freight rates which they believe the railroads are planning. The emphatic denial by the railroads was not taken seriously by most of the speakers. One said he had positive information that the roads had already compiled the rates and that presses were busy printing them.

The conclusion of the meeting was that, if driven to it, the shippers would go to the courts. They include the most powerful trade organizations east of the Mississippi.

That an advance in rates will disturb business conditions and is not justified was the tenor of resolutions adopted. It was voted that whereas C. C. McCain, chairman of the Trunk Line association, had compiled a pamphlet entitled "The Diminished Purchasing Power of Railway Earnings," and the railroads had circulated it to educate the public and prepare it for another increase in rates, and the pamphlet being "biased, partial and misleading," an executive committee should be created by the shippers to prepare an answer to the pamphlet and circulate it for the education of the public as to the true freight rate situation. The committee was appointed.

BOND ISSUE IS FOUND TO BE O.K.

Central Point Recorder Notified That Chicago House Will Accept Bonds.

Recorder T. M. Jones of Central Point has received notice from S. A. Kean & Co., the Chicago bond buyers, who are handling our the water bonds of that city, that the final papers relating to the deal from the town to that firm have been received and found satisfactory and that the bonds are now being printed and will be sent forward within a few days for the signature of the proper officials, says the Herald.

This should end the long delay the town has met with in getting actual construction under way and no doubt the preliminary arrangements will be rushed through and a contract for construction be let without further delay.

The issuance of \$25,000 in water bonds was authorized at the city election March 8, and when that matter was settled the next problem was to decide on a water supply. After some delay a well was decided upon as the only proposition available and property was secured and an eight-foot well was sunk to a depth of 50 feet. Tunnels were driven at the bottom crosscutting the water strata and a supply of better than 200 gallons per minute was demonstrated.

FIRE BUGS IN GOTHAM CLAIM TWO VICTIMS

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—Two were burned to death and 14 seriously injured today in a fire of incendiary origin which destroyed two three-story tenements at East Fifteenth street. The dead were:

Herman T. T. T., aged 34, and wife, Emma, aged 27.

Those responsible made careful preparations. The structures were filled with sleeping people. Oil was poured on the basement of the lower floors of one building and then set fire. The loss is \$50,000.
