PORTLAND APPLE MARKET LOADED

Prices Quoted Widely at Variance, but Show a Downward Tendency.

(Telegram.)
The apple market is pretty badly loaded up with soft and generally inferior stock, and as a result is weak. Prices quoted by different dealers on the same sorts and grades are so at variance that it is difficult to get an accurate line on values for the time, but it is probably safe to say that there is nothing in the market at this time worth more than \$2.50. Some of the leading fruit dealers as a matter of fact hold that the best now offered could not be moved at all readily at better than \$2.25.

For two weeks the supply in the Front street district has been liberal, and receipts from all quarters this week have been the heaviest since the opening of the season. A very large proportion of the fruit coming in, even from Hood River and other well known apple-growing sections of the state, grades from fair to common, and much of it is so soft that it cannot be held long. This in a measure accounts for the present wide variance in prices quoted. Little complaint is heard, however, regarding wormy or diseased fruit. The recent action of the fruit inspector practically put a stop to the shipment of such fruit to this market.

On the street today the best Spitzengbergs and Jonathans were held at \$2 to \$2.25 a box, but these of course are not the sort of apples that the Hood River and other growers sell at fancy prices for shipment to the eastern markets. Not much of that kind of fruit reaches the Portland market at any time of the year. Baldwin's of good quality went today at \$1.25 to \$1.75 a box, and California Bellflowers at \$1.50 to \$1.65.
