A special meeting of the City Council was held Friday night for the purpose of renewing the saloon license of High and Taylor.

G. W. Smith, City Marshal, Milton Berry, City Recorder, C. P. Jones, Street Commissioner, and L. C. Dodge, Supt. Water Works, submitted their respective reports for month ending Sept. 30, 1895, which were read and approved.

E. V. Carter, City Treasurer, submitted a report for the quarter ending Sept. 30, 1895, which was placed on file.

Eugene Walrad, Sexton of the Ashland Cemetery, presented a report for third quarter was read and placed on file.

It was voted that the sum of two dollars be paid to each of the first two teams and wagons to hitch onto the hose carts and haul them to the fire after the alarm is sounded.

Bills to the amount of \$395.43 were ordered paid.
