Water Case Settled.

At a special meeting Monday, the City Council received from Virgin & Co., a proposition, subject to the approval of the court, that the City of Ashland be allowed 100 cubic inches of water from Ashland creek at all times of the year and during the dry, irrigating season the flour mill would shut down two days in each week, besides Sunday.

The case has been settled in conformity with the above proposition, Tuesday's and Friday's being the days on which the mill will shut down during the dry season.
