WHEREAS, This occupation is fast becoming our greatest industry, and one in which the general public is and should be interested; and

WHEREAS, It would be a life long benefit to the recipients whether the life's labor was spent in country or city occupation: and

WHEREAS, It is impossible for the State Board in its work to reach the youths of our land in this fundamental instruction as they desire; therefore

RESOLVED, That it is the judgement of this Board that the State Board of Public Instruction should take measures to introduce into the Public Schools of this State a rudimentary line of instruction in horticulture, as the essential elements of our education to fit men and women for intelligent labor on the farm and in the orchard.

5. Oration by Prof. C. A. Hitchcock.
6. Vocal Music.

After the program, a recess will be had until 2:00 P. M., when a part of the Post will proceed to Hargadine Cemetery and a part to Talent, to decorate the comrade's graves at those places.
