A Creamery for Ashland.

W. J. Curtis, of the California Equipment and Construction Company, held a meeting in the Talent school house last night in the interest of establishing a creamery in Ashland. The farmers of that vicinity favored the project. A meeting will be held in the Ashland City Hall to-night.

Mr. Curtis desires to establish a creamery of 400 cows capacity, which would cost about \$3,000, stock company. A creamery of that size would separate cream from milk at the rate of 1500 gallons per hour. If Ashland favors the establishment of the enterprise, Mr. Curtis proposes to take a committee from here to Edgewood, to investigate the creamery business there.

This is a subject that should interest every citizen of Ashland, and a large turn-out is expected.
