In the write-up of the Assembly on first page, through some oversight, Selah Brown's "Fulfillment of Prophecy" last Friday afternoon was omitted. Mr. Brown had a large audience, and his address was such that all who heard it felt many times repaid for coming out on the warm day.

Monday morning at 10 o'clock, Dr. Carlos Martyn made his farewell address, "American Citizenship." In the afternoon, Rev. E. R. Dille addressed the Assembly on "Pioneers; Their Work and Wages," and acquitted himself in his usual pleasing, elevating style. The prelude to the evening lecture was rendered by Prof. I. E. Vining, of the Ashland Normal, who gave the audience a good idea of his ability in the line of elocution. Frank Lincoln, the Illinois humorist, then entertained the people with "Is music a Failure." All previous discourses having been deep, abounding in food for thought, the people were readily appreciative of something light with the humor on the surface. And those who attended the entertainment in anticipation of a good laugh were more than satisfied, for Mr. Lincoln produced a wholesome laugh at almost every word and movement, and people forgot the world in the enjoyment of the hour.

Prof. Straus, art instructor, delivered the Tuesday afternoon lecture, "Christ in Art." Tuesday evening, Mrs. Layton, of Colorado, produced a small musical concert on the "seven instruments in one" Crown piano furnished for the Assembly by C. F. Shepherd. Mrs. T. A. Hayes, of Independence, favored the audience with a very nicely rendered vocal solo. Frank Lincoln's lecture the previous evening evidently was a great drawing attraction, the building being entirely filled Tuesday evening, the largest number of people that had attended any lecture this year. With "The Ludicrous Side of Life," the humorist swayed his audience with laughter throughout the evening.

This year's Assembly has been under the management of G. F. Billings, and to him is due the highest praise and credit.
