City Council Proceedings.

MONDAY, AUGUST 3.

Regular meeting.—Present: Mayor, J. P. Dodge; Councilmen, D. F. Fox, C. B. Crisler, C. H. Gillette, C. H. Vaupe, W. J. Schmidt. Absent: Councilman, W. B. Millon.

Regular monthly reports of City officers read and placed on file.

The attention of the Council was called the fact that parties have been cutting trees along the banks of Ashland creek, thereby damaging the creek. The City attorney was instructed to ascertain from the land office what may be done to prevent such vandalism.

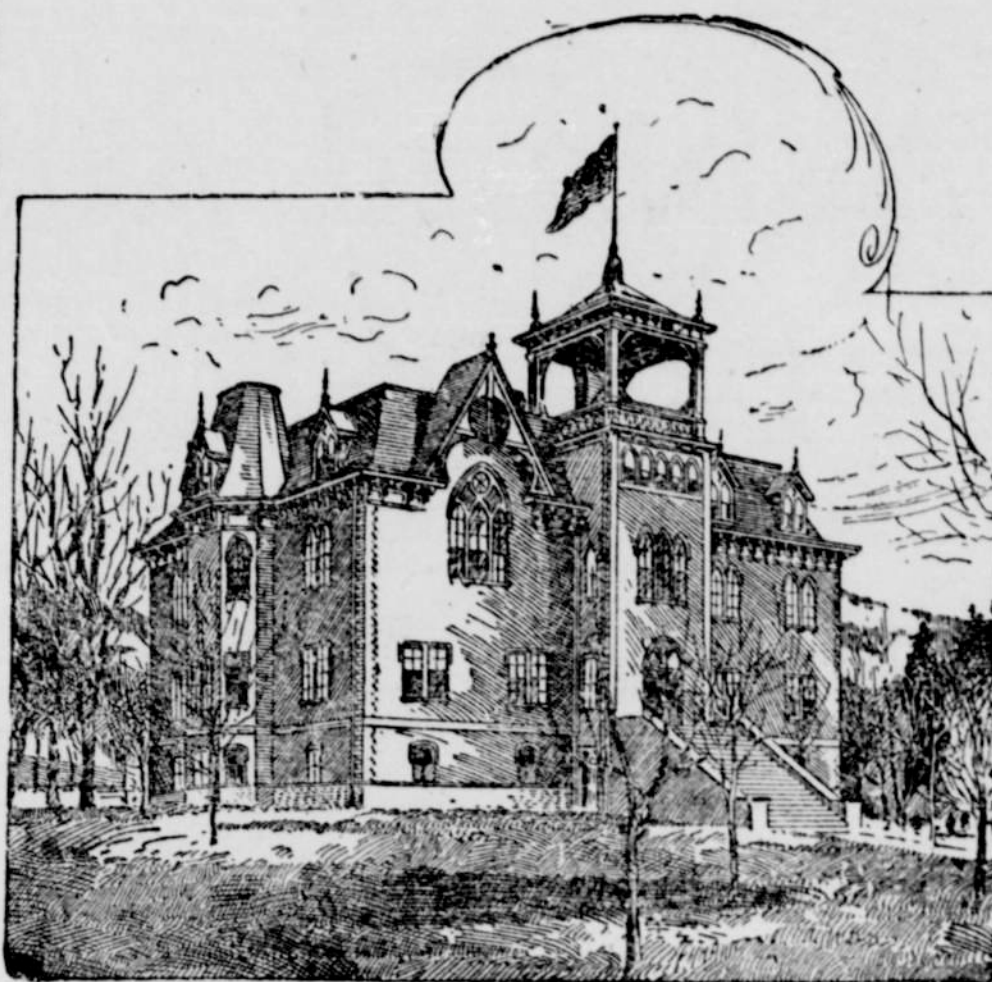
The following resolution was read and unanimously adopted, viz:

"RESOLVED, that the City Council invite the representatives of the U. S. Forestry Commission, now soon to visit Ashland, to an examination of the Ashland forest reserve, and that for this purpose, a committee, of which the Mayor shall be chairman, shall be appointed to tender to said Commission the freedom of the City, and that suitable arrangements be made for their entertainment, and that said Commission be notified of such action."

The Mayor appointed the members of the City Council and the City attorney on the committee.

So many users of the City water become delinquent in the payment of water rents that the Council instructed the Supt. of the Water Works to proceed at once to collect all delinquents during the month of August, and that, beginning with September 1st, he must strictly enforce the City Ordinance and turn off the water from each one who neglects or refuses to pay his water rent on or before the 5th of each month.

Bills to the amount of \$318.76 were approved and ordered paid.
