Three young men wish to do chores for board, and spend the small amount of money they have for other school expenses. Here is an opportunity to do a vast amount of good.

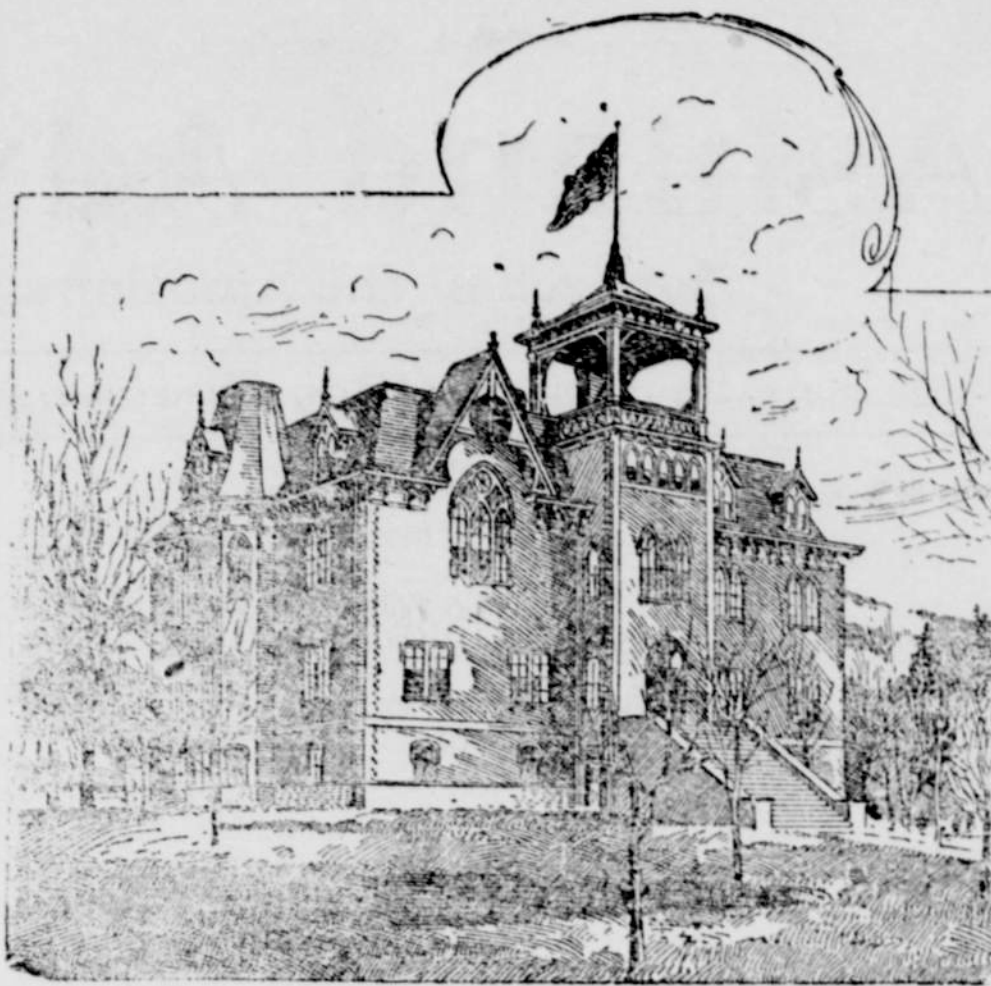

MEDFORD, Or., Aug. 15.—The planing mill here belonging to G. L. Schirmerhorn burned to the ground this evening, together with about 60,000 feet of lumber; also all of the dryhouses and a stable containing a considerable amount of grain and hay. The loss will foot up about \$5000, and is partially insured.

This is the fourth planing mill that has been destroyed by fire in this city during the last few years.—Oregonian.
