Who has a medium house and lot in Ashland to trade for a house and lot worth \$900 in Marshfield?

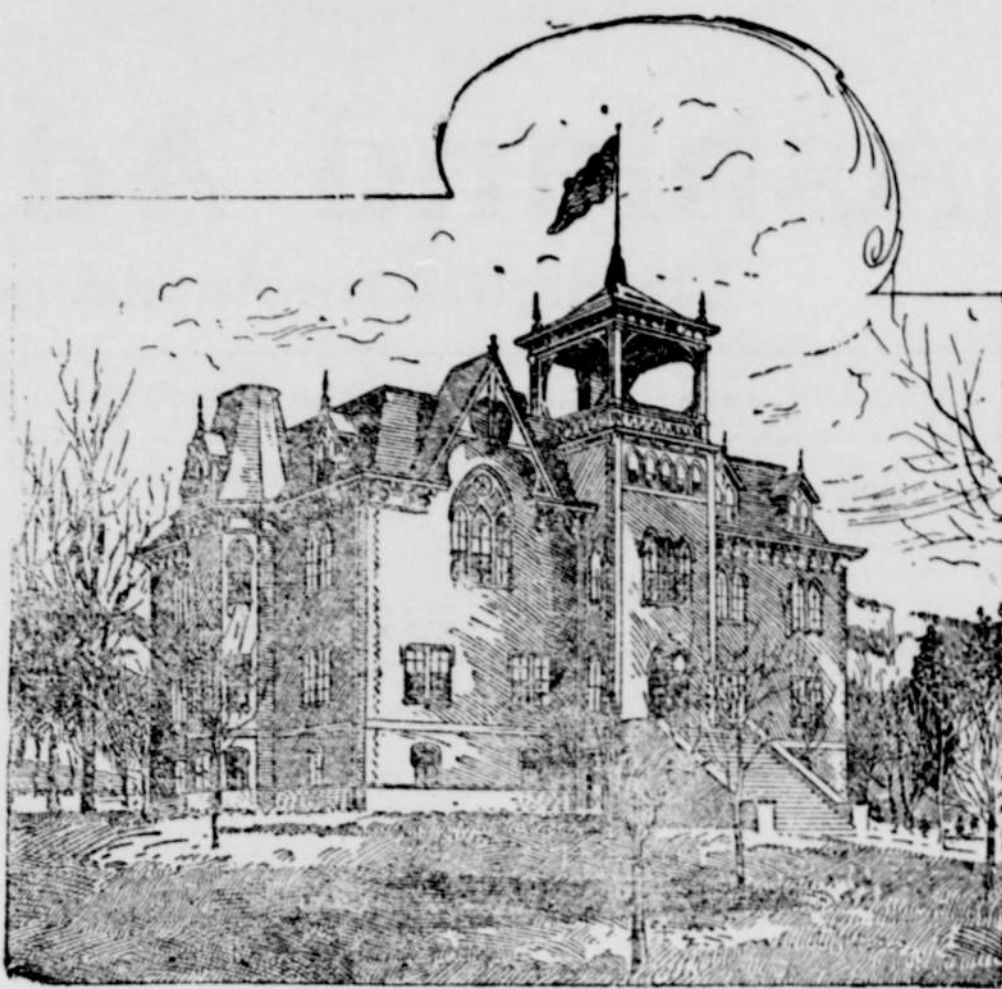
A man in Drain wishes to make such a trade in order to send his children to the Normal here, and also get the benefit of the winter climate.
