Report of Principal of Ashland Public Schools for month ending Oct. 2, 1896:

Number days taught, 20.
Number of holidays, 0.
Days of attendance, boys 4387 $\frac{1}{4}$; girls 4524; total 8911 $\frac{1}{2}$.
Days of absence, boys 198; girls 118 $\frac{1}{2}$; total 316 $\frac{1}{2}$.
Cases of tardiness, boys 34; girls 33; total 67.
Whole number enrolled on register, boys 244; girls 253; total 497.
New scholars, boys 244; girls 253; total 497.
Average daily attendance, 446.
Per cent of attendance, 96 $\frac{1}{2}$.
Number of visitors, 84.
Cases of corporal punishment, 4.
Tardiness of teachers, 0.
Days absence of teachers, 2 $\frac{1}{2}$.

The total attendance is a trifle greater than for September, 1895. The enrollment in the higher grades is increasing, as is the attendance at the High School. The Class of '97, of the High School, will be larger than the Class of '96, the present enrollment of that class being almost double that of the Class of '96. The record of tardiness is very good, being the least number of cases in any month during the last two years. It is hoped that several schools will show no cases for October.
