#### A New Treaty With Japan.

A commercial treaty between the  
United States and Japan, which was ne-  
gotiated two years ago, containing a sec-  
tion providing that, as to patents and  
trade-marks, the citizens of each country  
should have in the territory of the other  
the same protection as the citizens of  
that country, says the Youth's Compan-  
ion. But this treaty does not take effect  
until July, 1899, and in the meantime  
the highly ingenious Japanese have been  
imitating successfully American patent-  
ed articles, and by the aid of cheap labor  
have produced them at a cost which  
makes American competition difficult.  
To obviate this, a new treaty has been  
negotiated with Japan and has been rat-  
ified by the senate, by which the section  
referred to in the earlier treaty is given  
immediate effect.

#### Struck by a Locomotive.

Jake Beck, while sowing wheat in  
Cardwell's addition, near Jacksonville,  
Friday, left his team and wagon stand-  
ing near the Rogue River Valley rail-  
road track. As the evening train was  
coming, the horses became frightened  
and started to run. They rushed across  
the track in front of the train, and the  
engine struck the wagon, in which were  
two plows, and entirely wrecked the out-  
fit. The horses escaped uninjured, and  
no damage was done to train or passen-  
gers.—Oregonian.

#### The Ashland Team is Victorious.

The final championship foot ball con-  
test of the season was played on the
