City Council Proceedings.

SATURDAY, APRIL 17.

A saloon license for one year was granted to J. Conner.

The contract to finish constructing the new sidewalk along Third street was let to H. C. Messenger.

A petition for a sidewalk along A street, on north side of block C, was presented. The Council decided that travel on the street in question was not sufficient to justify compliance with the petition.

The Recorder was authorized to order water pipe to lay down Oak street.

The following ordinance was adopted:

CITY ORDINANCE NO. 176.

An ordinance prohibiting the setting up or maintaining of games of chance at which minors are allowed to play.

The people of the City of Ashland do ordain as follows:

SECTION I.

It shall be unlawful to permit minors to play at, or with, cards, dice, or any other game of chance, in any business house, or in any apartment connected therewith, whether said business house be a saloon, tobacco stand, confectionery store or any other character of business whatever, within the city of Ashland, Oregon.

SECTION II.

Section 1 of this ordinance is intended to cover nickel-in-the-slot machines, cards, dice and every other game or device by which gambling may be done, and to prohibit the allowance of games being played by minors at the places therein specified, either for pastime, amusement or gain.

SECTION III.

It shall be the duty of every proprietor, keeper or clerk, of each or any place of business mentioned in this ordinance to enforce compliance herewith, therein, and such proprietor, keeper or clerk shall be responsible for any violation of this ordinance occurring in his said place of business, or any room or apartment connected therewith, and shall be liable to prosecution and punishment therefor, as hereinafter provided.

SECTION IV.

It shall be the duty of the City Marshal of the City of Ashland, Oregon, to inquire into all alleged violation of this ordinance, and to file complaint with the City Recorder against any person or persons violating any of the provisions of this ordinance, and upon conviction thereof in said Recorder's Court, either upon a plea of guilty, or upon a trial thereof, such person or persons shall be fined not less than \$20.00 nor more than \$40.00, and in default of the payment of said fine, such person or persons shall be imprisoned in the City jail, in the City of Ashland, Oregon, not less than ten days nor more than twenty days, for each offense.

SECTION V.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its adoption by the Council and approval by the Mayor.
