The girls of the Willamette university and the Harrison institute played a game of basket ball in Salem last Saturday afternoon. The score was 2 to 0, in favor of the Indian girls of the institute.

A small, brown-colored bird, about the size of the Oregon snowbird, is creating havoc among the cherry blossoms of Polk county. The bird cuts the stem off close to the bud, and simply drops the bud to the ground.

Street Car Accident in Portland.

A terrible street car accident occurred in Portland yesterday morning. Car No. 52, of the City and Suburban electric line, left the rails on East Morrison street, a few feet east of the corner of East Eighth street, and plowing its way across the bridge, dropped thirty feet into mud and water below. Three persons were killed and fifteen injured.

Populists Had a Big Time.

Proceedings of the recent county populist convention are reported as follows:

The populist county central committee met in Medford Friday and perfected organization of the party in this county. Delegates were present from almost all of the precincts in the county, and there were some warm times. Ashland delegates were declared to be unlawfully chosen, and the chairman refused to seat them. In the course of the argument it became necessary to use force in ejecting one of the would-be delegates, M. F. Eggleston, and in so doing, Representative Howser and E. J. Kaiser, editor of the Valley Record, came to blows, and had not friends and the city marshal interfered, a hot fight would undoubtedly have resulted. A resolution was adopted endorsing the action of the populists who took part in the legislative hold-up and opposing fusion with any other political party. A resolution condemning the Valley Record in the following language was adopted:

"Whereas, The Valley Record has during the year proved untrue to the principles of the people's party; therefore, be it

"Resolved, That we denounce it as not being a populist paper, and one that does not represent any of the important principles of reform."

Hon. W. S. U'Ren was present and addressed the meeting, explaining in detail the cause of the late legislative hold-up.

M. F. Eggleston, who was taken in charge by Marshal Churchman, was fined in the recorder's court Saturday for disturbing the meeting.

An accident of a very serious nature occurred in Ashland last Friday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. The victim was Mrs. James Adams, of this place. She was riding a horse down Main street; when near the south school building the animal became frightened and threw the rider. As the lady fell, the horse kicked her in the face with terrific force. Mr. Adams was leading a couple of horses ahead of his wife, and was on hand to render prompt assistance. The services of a horse and buggy were generously tendered the unfortunate people, and the injured lady was quickly taken to Dr. J. S. Herndon's office on Oak street, where her wounds were dressed. Her injuries are a crushed nose and several bad cuts about the face. It is feared that the shock to the brain may result fatally.

OREGON WEATHER BUREAU REPORT.—The weather conditions are favorable to all vegetation; and unless the unexpected happens, the crops of grain, fruit, vegetables, hay, hops, etc., will be the largest in the history of the State. While March was a most unfavorable month and greatly retarded the growth of all vegetation, the very favorable weather since has placed vegetation forward, so that now it is almost as far advanced as though March had been a normal month.

Favorable weather is expected to continue, with higher temperatures, becoming cooler the latter part of the current week.
