MEDFORD, June 13.—Word reached this morning that L. C. Quisley had been shot and instantly killed by "Doc" Scraggs, at the Whippley ranch, near Prospect, about 40 miles from here. The shooting occurred yesterday, and Scraggs claims self defense. He says that Quisley was in the act of taking hay from his field, and when he attempted to stop him, Quisley dropped the hay and made a charge upon him with a fork, whereupon he shot him.—Oregonian.

Chas. Rose, who is employed in the Ashland woolen mill, was bruised up considerably last Saturday by being thrown from the wagon of a runaway team that he was trying to stop. The team was running past the mill, and Charles ran out and climbed into the wagon to grab the reins; he was thrown out as the wagon swung round a corner. The services of Dr. Parson were required to dress his injuries, the principal one of which was a large gash on the head.

Elk creek, about forty miles north of Medford, is the scene of great mining excitement. Word having been given out that there was considerable wealth in that vicinity, people from all points down the valley hastened to the place and staked out claims. It is stated that the number of people there now is about 300. According to the report, the territory occupied by the mines is four or five miles in width and about ten miles in length. It appears to be a mountain of quartz; at places the ore is at the surface of the ground, while at others it is many feet underground. At present, the excitement runs high, and large numbers of gold-seekers are daily arriving at the camp.
