The baloon ascension which many were particularly anxious to see, was a failure, the baloon rising only about fifty feet.

Twice within a few weeks past a "father of the House" has died. Kelley in the first instance, and Randall in the second, and yet the honor still remains with Pennsylvania. That title will now go to Charles O'Neill, of the second district of that State, who entered Congress with Randall in 1863, but who was out of office a few years afterward for one term.

D. P. Thompson the nominee for governor on the republican ticket is a man above reproach, personally, and of great energy and enterprise. He has taken a great interest in education and was elected school director in Portland a second time, by a large vote. He will carry Portland.

As election time approaches, voters should carefully consider the situation. An immediate high tax

action might follow as the result. In "Polk" politics will have but little to do in supporting either ticket. Taxation for a new Court House comes to the front.
