Arguing a Technicality.

The eagerness with which lawyers jump at technicalities to help out their cases, no matter how absurd the technical point may be, is a matter of wonderment to laymen. Some illustration of this tendency of the legal profession is given nearly every day in the courts in a more or less laughable form. A few days ago a lawyer who was trying in the supreme court to secure the release on a writ of habeas corpus of a man who had been committed for some misdemeanor raised the point that the commitment stated that the crime occurred Sept. 14, 182, and that consequently the statute of limitations freed his client from punishment on account of it.
