IRRESPECTIVE of any political bias, we certainly believe that the first congressional district of Oregon can do no better just now than to return Mr. Hermann to congress.

THE merits of the two Salem papers, the Journal and the Statesman, are appreciated, but under different trade marks.

THE following is a summary of the result of the election held on the 2d inst. Maryland—Democrats carried everything, the governor elected by 30,000.

Pennsylvania—Republican majority of about 60,000. Virginia—Democrats swept everything.

Massachusetts—Democratic governor, balance of ticket Republican. New Jersey—Democrats made heavy gains and elected entire senatorial ticket, and 41 out of 49 assemblymen, a majority of 53 in joint ballot.

Ohio—Republicans elected governor and 74 of the 107 members of the house and 18 of the 31 senators. New York—Democrats elect a full state ticket.

Iowa—Democratic governor, house and senate about evenly divided; Farmers Alliance and labor party elected five members of the house. Nebraska—Everything Republican.

Colorado—Republican chief justice. Kansas—Democrats and Republicans united to overthrow Farmers Alliance, and succeeded.
